



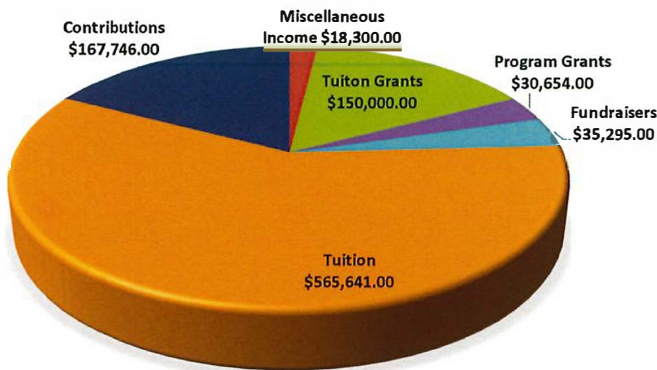
MORRISON SCHOOL

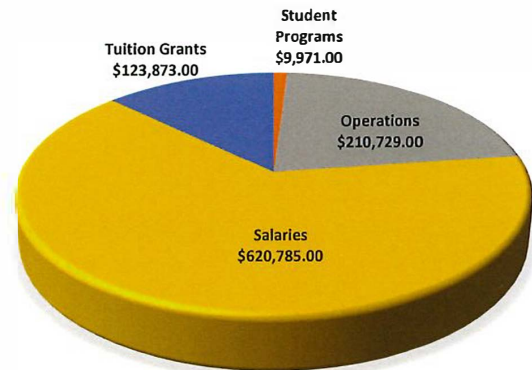
Morrison School was founded in 1977 by Arthur and Sharon Morrison. It grew out of a summer tutoring program for students experiencing school-related problems (primarily learning disabilities and attention deficit disorder). The first physical facility was established on the campus of Sullins College in Bristol, Virginia. In 1979 Morrison School moved to Emmanuel Episcopal Church in downtown Bristol, Virginia. The school bought a farmhouse in 1981 on the border of the city of Bristol and Washington County, Virginia. In 1984 satellite schools were opened in Johnson City and Kingsport, Tennessee. The combined enrollment of the two satellite schools approached 100 students. The satellite schools continued to operate in those communities until 1990 when the school consolidated back into the original Bristol, Virginia facility. At the Bristol facility, enrollment steadily grew to the point that a larger building was needed. In the summer of 2015, a 20,113 square foot building was opened at the current location on Edgewood Lane. This project was the result of the contributions of many generous people. Land was donated, over 2.2 million dollars was contributed to build the school, furniture was provided free of cost and the labor to build the school was done at cost. The new Morrison School can comfortably accommodate 80 students in grades PK-12.

INCOME - \$967,636.00

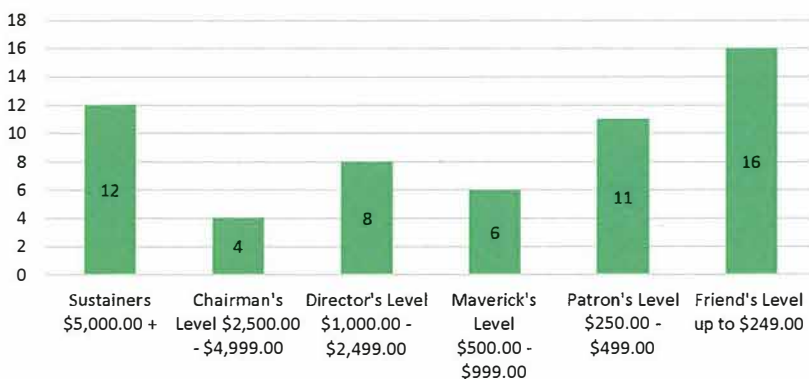


EXPENSES - \$965,358.00

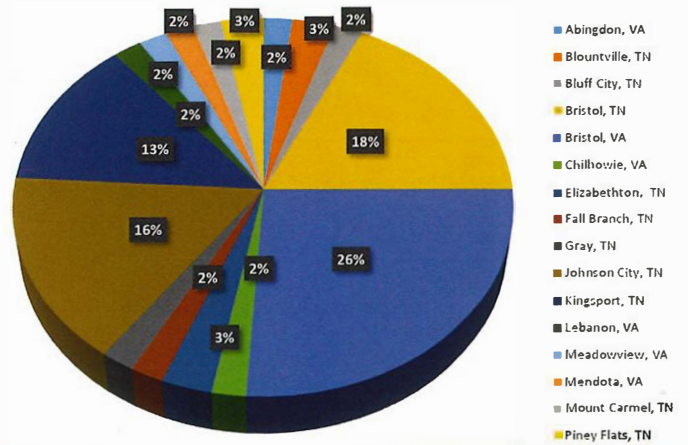

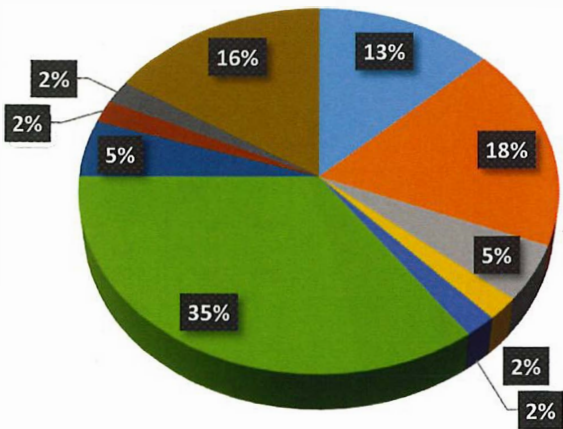
